

ESTABLISHED IN 1988, THE INTERNATIONAL PRINTING MUSEUM HAS DEVELOPED OVER THE YEARS TO BECOME more than just a repository of Ernie Lindner's great collection of antique presses...it is a living, working experience of the most important invention ever—the printed word! And the LA Printers Fair is a celebration of just that.

When Ernie Lindner began building his beautiful collection of antique printing equipment in the late 1940's, letterpress was still the main commercial process for printing. As a Los Angeles equipment dealer, Ernie would get into the back rooms of many old shops and find their "junk," those obsolete and used printing presses that no longer performed the daily work of the printer. They were destined for the scrap yard but for visionary collectors such as Ernie Lindner. And so he collected for 50 years, building one of the largest collections in the world, with the hope that young printers and artists would someday use those presses again.

In Ernie's day, the term Book Arts was not yet coined; they simply called it Fine Printing—an attention to beautiful printing, paper, type, design and binding. As a tradition, fine printing goes back to the end of the 19th century with the Arts & Crafts Movement and William Morris. The book arts and letterpress revival of today is the inheritor of those ideals of craftsmanship, but with an expansion of expression and creativity. It was always Ernie Lindner's dream to see the presses in his collection to be used and enjoyed by younger generations. Though Ernie died on October 3rd, 2001 his dream is very much alive in the annual Los Angeles Printers Fair at the International Printing Museum held each fall.

Following our 25th Anniversary this last year, the Printing Museum is continuing its Building Campaign to expand and improve the Printing Museum. THE INTERNATIONAL PRINTING MUSEUM Featuring the World Famous Lindner Collection

The International Printing Museum features the Ernest A. Lindner Collection. Recognized by many authorities as the finest collection in the world, the Lindner Collection spans more than 500 years of graphic communication history.

As a young man, Ernest Lindner began collecting while working for his uncle and father who rebuilt and sold used typesetting equipment in Los Angeles. "We would sell a man a machine and take in trade a piece he was replacing. I couldn't bear to throw away some of these wonderful machines, so I began shoving them into corners, even after there were no more corners!"


